
Seeking Safer Cycling

Imari lives in Decatur's Oakhurst neighborhood. It's probably one of the most bike-friendly areas in all of metro Atlanta. A long stretch of the PATH runs though Decatur providing an easy, clearly marked route for cyclists. Signage and street markings that define bike friendly zones are all throughout the community.
